## The Global Challenge Network+ in Advanced Radiotherapy Impact Sandpit: 'Dragons' Den style'

On 6 and 7 of June 2019, Sam Flynn and Tony Price went to the Advanced Radiotherapy Impact Sandpit in Manchester to represent a collaboration consisting of the University of Birmingham, University Hospitals Birmingham, and the National Physical Laboratory. The event was based on the popular television show "Dragons' Den", where many participants would pitch a novel or innovative idea to 'Dragons' (represented by experts and non-experts in radiotherapy) for a share of a £100,000 pot.

Advanced Radiotherapy

Tony and Sam at the Advanced <u>Radioth</u>erapy Impact Sandpit

The pair were successfully awarded £15,000 to develop an adjustable microbeam collimator for the University of Birmingham's 40 MeV proton cyclotron. Microbeam radiotherapy (consisting of narrow beams of radiation < 0.1 mm) has shown a lot of promise for treating hard to treat tumours based on cellular and veterinary studies, but a significant amount of research is still required before human trials can be performed. The developed collimator will enable domestic and international researchers to conduct many types of cellular investigations, with a key objective of developing a series of metrological recommendations for accurate dosimetry.

The project was praised by the 'Dragons' for having a strong collaborative team with a high chance of succeeding. Further information about this can be found by contacting Sam Flynn, Tony Price, Ileana Silvestre Patallo or Anna Subiel.

# NPL host GRADnet Summer School for SEPnet

A parallel strand was the consultancy challenges where students took on the role of a consultant and had to propose a solution to a 'real world' challenge facing an employer. The challenges this year were provided by Adaptix Ltd, BlueOptima and Rutheford Appleton Laboratory. The programme also included talks on Intellectual Property Rights, Future Careers and Networking, and an insight into teaching with IOP Teaching. Thank you to Dr Laura Kent at NPL for running the Science Communication session and for organising the pub quiz.

## To give you a taste of the PGI Conference 2019 line-up, here are some bios for a few of our keynote speakers...

**Elisa Morgera** is Professor of Global Environmental Law and Co-Director of Strathclyde Centre for Environmental Law and Governance. She specialises in international, European and comparative environmental law, with a particular focus on the interaction between biodiversity law and human rights (particularly those of indigenous peoples and local communities), equity and sustainability in natural resource development, oceans governance, and corporate accountability. Elisa has also researched the environmental dimensions of the external relations of the European Union (EU).

**Professor Graeme Reid** is a specialist advisor to the House of Lords Science and Technology Committee for their work on science and is a trustee of the Association of Medical Research Charities. Graeme worked at the National Engineering Laboratory before moving to Central Government for positions in the Treasury, the Cabinet Office, and the DTI before the formation of BIS in 2009.

**Fred Wilson** is a specialist in Medical Imaging and Physiological Measurement Biomarkers with over 15 years' experience encompassing the pharmaceutical industry, UK National Health Service and industrial R&D. He has a track record in strategy development and directing successful collaborations between academia and industry. Areas of interest include medical imaging, physiological measurements (including EEG), applying imaging/ physiological measurement biomarkers to decision-making in drug development.

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
